4: Over the past 12 months have there been any changes to the way your ISC is funded? <u>Yes</u> / No. If yes, please provide details.

Palmerston Safe Communities program is currently funded by the department of Health (Office of Children and Families). Funding to supplement the Palmerston Safe Communities program was provided over a term of three years and due for renewal in June 2013. City of Palmerston will actively seek additional funding to facilitate and supplement the program within the future.

The City of Palmerston Council commits \$5000.00 per annum to compliment Palmerston Safe Communities programs, events and collaborative initiatives. The program has also been successful in obtaining additional funding to continue its injury prevention and safety promotion campaigns throughout Palmerston.

The program was awarded with a grant of \$10,000.00 to promote a program titled 'Operation Bounce Back'. City of Palmerston partnered with NT Police from the National Motor Vehicle Theft Reduction Council (NMVTRC) to run Operation Bounce Back from October 2011 to March 2012.





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Operation Bounce Back aimed to reduce car theft by promoting car safe messages and through the provision of 100 vouchers to have an immobiliser installed in their vehicle.

Additional funding of \$6,865.00 was awarded to the City of Palmerston by the Commonwealth Bank Community Staff Foundation. The title of the funded program is 'Safe Start for Palmerston City Schools' (SSPCS). These funds will assist with the delivery of Child Safety Australia's, Protective Behaviours messages to be implemented in the Palmerston region. City of Palmerston Safe Communities will commence its 'Safe Start Palmerston City School Kids' program on 29 April 2013 (School Term 2).

Safety kits will be available to all primary Schools in Palmerston, workshop participants and other non-profit organisations upon request. Participants will receive resources to compliment Safety and reinforce key safety messages to children, building self-esteem, respect and empathy, identifying and responding to unsafe situations, avoiding and stopping all forms of abuse and encouraging children to access help from trusted adults and organisations. The Safe Start program seeks to maximise safety and enhance the wellbeing of children and young people and encourage them to reach their full potential. Safe Start targets children aged 3 - 12 years. The Safe Start workshops are designed for adults who regularly interact with children and young people. By training adults, who are able to relay and reinforce the key safety messages, this specialised training has the potential to reach significant numbers of children to achieve lasting benefits.

The Safe Start program is based on the following underlying principles:

- Children and young people have a right to be safe and to feel safe.
- Child protection is a community responsibility and we all have a part to play.

Protective adults, particularly parents and carers, have a responsibility to protect children and young people from harm and to equip them with safety knowledge and skills.

- A healthy self-esteem is fundamental to self-protection and a person's ability to reach their full potential.
- To maximise their safety, children and young people must be equipped with an awareness of risks and empowered with strategies and skills to effectively respond to safety threats.

The programs were developed by Kim Jackson in 2008 to address the limitations, and build upon the strengths, of the international Protective Behaviours program. Safe Start expands on the traditional Protective Behaviours content, embraces additional key safety messages and enhances delivery methods to reflect current best practice guidelines in child protection.

The programs have been independently reviewed and found to be effective in





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providing prevention education to reduce the risk of victimisation for children and adolescents, including the various harmful behaviours.

For maximum success, the programs should be:

- implemented throughout the whole school or children's organisation;
- delivered by trained staff; and multi systemic, involving children, young people, their parents/carers and teachers.

Safe Communities are currently accepting expressions of interest for Teachers, Parents and Carers to participate in the sponsored Safe Start Coordinators workshops to be conducted during April and May 2013.

In addition 'Safe Start' sessions will be delivered to Schools and community organisations. Each of the nine Palmerston Schools and the Palmerston Public Library will receive a set of safety kit resources.

During December 2012 the City of Palmerston on behalf of the Palmerston Safe Kids Network were provided with additional funding from the Commonwealth Bank as detailed above in Criterion 1.4.

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2012 focussed on achieving greater community safety and security awareness in and around the home and neighbourhood. Topics and campaigns covered during 2012 were:

- 'Road & Drive Way Safety'
- 'Online Safety'
- 'Street Safety'
- 'Home Safety'
- 'Water Safety'
- 'Crime Prevention'
- 'Theft Reduction'

These (7) focus areas of safety aimed to combat the many issues facing our community neighbourhoods affecting vulnerable families. Outcomes:

City of Palmerston in collaboration with NT Police obtained crime related statistics within Palmerston's region in the month of September 2012. As a result Safe Communities formed an alliance with Safety House NT an initiative of Neighbourhood Watch NT to boost Safety House numbers in Palmerston (both residential and commercial). Attached is a media release pertaining to details of the effectiveness of the targeted program.

The evaluations provided insight into what worked and what should be improved to enhance such programs. The safe communities' facilitated workshops were well received by the community. For instance the VSA workshop received 36 participants with positive feedback noted. The CPTED workshop proved a success in establishing recommendations to improvements for community parks and public places. Last but not least was the successful Cyber Safety workshop which opened the way for more productive sessions planned to be held throughout the year 2013.

The programs and initiatives have shown what the community needs and effectively prove that early intervention and preventative education and awareness of safety issues are of importance to Palmerston. In line with this, one of the key strategic goals for 2013 beyond is the facilitation of collaborative (partnered) community educational programs such as the 'Safe Start' workshops and planned Cyber Safety workshops to commence in April/ May 2013.

International:

City of Palmerston's Mayor and Chief Executive Officer attended the New Zealand World Health Organisation Conference on 1st October 2012 to 4th October 2012. This conference included a comprehensive programme of events/ training sessions and provided an overall view of the 'safe communities' model. Such networking opportunities at an international level support the Palmerston Safe Communities submission for re-designation during 2013.

National:

Pan-Pacific Australasian Safe Communities webinar Launch

City of Palmerston's Mayor, Safe Communities Coordinator and Director for Community and Corporate Services participated in the above mentioned webinar. This was the launch of numerous webinars which provide international networking opportunities. In attendance were representatives from approximately 14 designated safe communities within Australia and Wellington New Zealand. The webinar entailed an overview of selected communities and how they were achieving greater awareness on safety promotion and injury prevention among communities and families.

Final comments:

Over the past 12 months, what have been some of the biggest challenges to your ISC and what steps have you taken to address these?

Duplication:

Many beneficial programs and initiatives have been identified by partner organisations. However, the feedback provided at Palmerston Safe Kids Network meetings are the fact that we are all working to achieve a definitive goal (or) purpose





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but with many overlapping events and programs. In light of this the Safe Communities Coordinator initiated the facilitation of a specific working group to address program and events namely for October's Community Safe month which includes 'Children's Week' and National Kidsafe Day'. In the early stages of this group will be member organisations such as NAPCAN, Kidsafe NT, Australian Red Cross and Palmerston Safe Communities with the intention to include children's service providers.

Over the past 12 months, what have been some of the biggest opportunities for your ISC and what steps have you taken to sustain them?

Sustaining active membership of the Palmerston Safe Communities Committee has proved to be a challenge. Such challenges are due to a number of factors including staff movements and/ or changes to organisational structure (especially within Government organisations).

We have effectively combated this by taking a collaborative approach to working with partner organisations promoting community safety of a high standard. Joint initiatives have been facilitated through organisations such as Safety House NT, Amity, The Smith Family and Kidsafe NT.

Re-establishing or rather re-invigorating such partnerships has been crucial to the ongoing success of gaining community ownership to the Palmerston Safe Communities Program. In addition the opportunity to attend the NZ International World Health Conference presented great networking opportunities and provided an education of what other communities are achieving in promoting safety.
