welcome to Nalmerston

Unlike many communities, Palmerston was a planned development with the first residents settling in November 1982. In August 2000 it was officially declared a city and is often referred to as one of Australia's fastest growing cities.

Palmerston has a young population with a median age of 30.2 years, with over 25% of the community under 15 years and 39% under 25 years. The population at 30 June 2017 was 36,483 and is predicted to reach 40,000 by 2020.

Council is committed to providing quality services for Palmerston's active community. The city is also home to a large contingent of Defence Personnel and families and given these demographics the city ensures an abundance of recreational services and facilities for the community.

Council boasts an aquatic centre in Moulden, a recreation centre and gymnasium in the City Centre, and a number of sporting grounds dotted in and around the city with the recent addition of the Palmerston Water Park adjacent to our city centre.

Palmerston's seniors have a strong voice in the community, with residents over 65 increasingly choosing to settle and stay in Palmerston. To ensure the city caters for all sectors of the community, Council has number of community based committees that provide advice to Elected Members and Council staff on a regular basis.

The city comprises of mostly residential properties with new suburbs Zuccoli, The Heights and Johnston joining established suburbs Driver, Gray, Woodroffe, Moulden, Durack, Farrar, Gunn, Rosebery, Bakewell, Marlow Lagoon and Bellamack.

Palmerston has two light industrial/ service commercial estates, Pinelands and Yarrawonga. The City Centre is home to its own post office and two of three major shopping centres, a number of restaurants and take away stores, all major banks, library, indoor recreation centre and a cinema complex.

The City of Palmerston is a body corporate comprising of elected members and is presided over by the Mayor. It is responsible for the government and management of the area at the local level (Local Government Act).

Council maintains responsibility for providing services to add to the wellbeing of its community. It forms policies, exercises its statutory powers, decides upon the level of rates and how council funds are to be allocated. Council has a service provision role, a regulatory role and advocacy role. Council also plays a role in planning and co-ordination and provides an avenue for community participation. However unlike in other parts of Australia; Planning and Building are not Council responsibilities and these decisions are made by the Northern Territory Government. Community Development is also an integral part of the Council's role in Palmerston.

Elected Members determine Council policy and strategic direction. Their role is to ensure services meet the needs and expectations of the community, and to monitor the performance of the organisation. Elected Members are involved in resourcing and planning for a wide range of local services and consulting with the community as elected representatives. The Mayor also holds the status of 'first citizen' and conducts citizenship ceremonies and other ceremonial duties.

Members of the public are welcome to observe Council Meetings, usually held on the first and third Tuesday of the month at 5.30pm in Council Chambers, Civic Plaza. These are preceded by a community forum at 5pm where residents can discuss issues of concern. Council business papers and agenda are made available to the public on Council's website, www.palmerston.nt.gov.au.

COUNCIL DEPARTMENTS

Council's organisation is led by the Chief Executive Officer, who is accountable to the current Council.

Our structure is made up of three departments: City Growth and Operations, Corporate Services and Community Services, each led by a Director.

City Growth and Operations is divided into two sections:

Civil Operations and Open Space: response for maintaining parks and gardens, council owned infrastructure (such as community centres and roads), rubbish collection and environmental management. In the Northern Territory, Councils do not administer planning and development applications.

Ranger Services: responsible for legislation, regulations and by-laws relating to Palmerston. This includes traffic management, animal management, signage and public places.



Corporate Services incorporates Finance, Human Resources, Records Management, Information Technology, Media and Communications and Customer Service.

Community Services is responsible for the City of Palmerston Library and Community Development, which includes events, youth, recreation, health and well-being and safety.

COUNCIL FUNDING

Council receives the majority of its funding from rates (around 86%), federal NT grants, reimbursements, statutory charges and investments. Council also receives additional funding for specific projects and services, such as workshops and community events, through grants and sponsorship.

RATES

Rates are determined by Council each year. Rates can be paid in full by 30 September or in instalments. Information on how to pay and instalment dates are on rates notices. Each year, Council runs an early bird draw which gives two ratepayers who pay their rates in full by the first instalment date the chance to win \$1,500 each! Terms and conditions, can be found on Council's website.

TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT

Council is responsible for traffic management within Palmerston. Council also has a traffic maintenance program including roundabouts and traffic lights, street lighting and other safety features. Disabled parking permit forms are available from Council. Vehicles are not allowed to be sold by the roadside in Palmerston.

LIGHTING

Council controls the management and maintenance of public lights within Palmerston area. This includes street and park lighting (but excludes the lighting along Northern Territory Government roads).

The ongoing operation and maintenance of lighting is an important part of community safety. Residents can assist by reporting any street light faults to Council. All lights have an identification number located on the pole, identifying this number to the appropriate authority will assist in quicker repairs.

ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT

Local residents, Council and community groups are working together to ensure the protection of many of the key environmental values around Palmerston. These include the preservation of bush land, climate change, water quality and biodiversity.

Community awareness and interest has traditionally been strong and has contributed to the setting aside of land for reserves which would otherwise have been developed. An example has been the creation of the 20ha Palmerston Escarpment Reserve, which has ensured that a green corridor will be protected in the long term.

Council has facilitated several successful initiatives to address some of the environmental issues affecting Palmerston. The Mitchell Creek Landcare Group has been actively involved in planning issues throughout the catchment, and has revegetated and maintained vegetation along the creek.

BY-LAWS

Council makes its own by-laws which may differ from other places in Australia or the Territory, such as sign regulations, dogs and sale of cars. By-laws are available on Council's website.

COMMUNITY GRANTS

Council's Community Benefit Scheme is open all year round (by financial year) and all community groups (not for profit) are eligible to apply. Details of how to apply are available on Council's website.



city of Nalmerston Library

The City of Palmerston Library is located in the City Centre at Goyder Square. Discover the library's wide range of items for loan including books, magazines, dvd's, manga, ebooks and emagazines. The Library offers an unlimited number of loans to members on all physical items. The City of Palmerston Library is also part of the Connect NT network which means you can borrow from any other public library in the NT using your City of Palmerston Library card.

Membership is free to residents who live in the Northern Territory. Simply visit the City of Palmerston Library with identification that includes your current NT residential address. For non-residents, membership is available and a refundable deposit is required.

INTERNET AND COMPUTER ACCESS

Access to the internet and computers are available to library members and the general public. Library members are entitled to one hour a day, free of charge on designated computers. Alternatively, public computers are available for a small fee. Free wireless internet access is available at the City of Palmerston Library and Goyder Square 24 hours a day. Download up to 200mb daily with no time limit.

safe Communities

Palmerston is the Northern Territory's first Safe Community, recognised by the World Health Organisation. The Safe Communities program was developed in Sweden and now has members across the world, including more than 15 designated Safe Communities in Australia.

In order to become a Safe Community, Palmerston formed working partnerships between Council, community, businesses and Government in order to reduce and prevent injuries, accidents, crime and promote safety in the home, community, at work and at play.

Palmerston has a Safe Communities

Committee which includes representatives from Council, Government, Health, Education, Police, business and other sectors relating to safety in the community.

Palmerston

Council's Ranger Services team is friendly and helpful. Their aim is to help animal owners take proper care of their pets, through education and the provision of the Marlow Lagoon Pet Park, the only place where active dogs can run off leash.

All dogs in the Palmerston municipal area must be registered with Council annually and wear the issued registration tag. This fee will enable your dog to be registered for a financial year starting from 1 August, with a part year fee applying to new dogs registered in the second half of the year.

Council has a maximum 'two dog' policy. A license is required if you wish to keep more than two dogs and this will only be granted in exceptional circumstances. The license process includes the owner demonstrating a history of responsible dog ownership, completing detailed selection criteria as well as demonstrating that exceptional circumstances exist to warrant keeping more than two dogs. The process also includes surveying neighbours and a site inspection.

Residents with dogs that have been micro chipped arriving from interstate are encouraged to update their details with their microchip service provider as soon as possible. All dogs impounded are scanned for microchip information. Current contact details can assist in the safe return of your dog.

If your dog escapes your yard, you can visit our online dog pound at www.palmerston.nt.gov.au. Photographs and details of all dogs collected are uploaded, usually within hours of being picked up.

Council has anti-barking collars and animal traps available for hire if required.

Council needs notification of the death, loss or change of address of your dog for our records.

Council encourages responsible pet ownership. Ranger Services officers offer animal education and advice on pets in Palmerston. For more information, call 8935 9977.

Council also has a Nuisance Barking Strategy, offering assistance to neighbours and dog owners. The strategy is available on the Council's website.



waste Management

A garbage collection service is provided to all residential addresses in Palmerston. Every house or unit block with three or less units is provided with a 120L red general waste wheelie bin and a 240L yellow lid recycling wheelie bin. The general waste bin is collected twice weekly and the recycling once a fortnight.

Collection day calendars are distributed annually but you can also get one from the Council website or by calling Council.

On your collection day put the bins on the verge before 7am. Leave at least half a metre between your bins on the verge.

Bins should only be on the verge on collection day – the rest of the time they should be in your yard or bin enclosure.

Blocks of units of four or more have a separate garbage collection and an equivalent number of bins to single households. Units have a designated bin enclosure where Cleanaway collects the waste manually.

Unit complex bins are collected four times a week on Monday, Wednesday, Friday and Saturday with recycle bins collected each Thursday.

WASTE MANAGEMENT FACILITY

The Archer Waste Management Facility, located off Elrundie Avenue is a temporary facility that is available to all Palmerston residents. It is open 7 days from 8am to 6pm.

General waste and most household items can be disposed of at the site. There are bins to dispose of whitegoods, gas bottles, car oil and recyclables.

The site does not accept car bodies, tyres, toxic substances, sewerage effluent, flammable products and asbestos. If you are unsure about what you can take to the facility please contact Council.

RECYCLING

Recycling plays a vital part in reducing landfill waste and increasing the lifespan of resources.

These items can be put in your yellow lid recycling bin:

- Aluminium and steel cans
- Milk and juice cartons
- Newspaper and cardboard
- Glass bottles and jars
- Plastic (including bottles and packaging) with the '1' to '7' symbols

Please ensure that items placed in the recycling bin are only those listed above. Contaminant, such as the wrong type of plastic, placed in a recycling bin will result in the bin not being collected.





If the contaminant is unnoticed by the garbage collector then the whole truck of recycled rubbish may need to be disposed of in landfill.

COMPOST

Composting is a great way to reduce household waste and also benefits your garden. It is easy to set up and can cost as little as \$40 for a composting bin from hardware stores, or nothing if you want to make your own area.

All organic waste (as indicated on the list below) is placed in the bin and after occasional turning the waste becomes rich organic compost that can be used on your garden. Kits come with instructions and there is plenty of information on the internet, such as on Clean Up Australia's website www.cleanup.org.au and www.howtocompost.org.

Add to your compost: vegetable and food scraps, leaves, tea bags and coffee grounds, vacuum cleaner dust, vegetable cooking oil (after use), old newspapers (moist), grass cuttings, wood ash and more.

Don't add to your compost: meat products, dairy products, glass, plastic, animal manure, magazines, large branches, weed with stems or seeds, bread, bones and sawdust from treated timber.

Lifestyle

Palmerston has a range of retail shops catering to all interests, with three major shopping centres, parklands, sporting facilities and fishing.

The city also features a cinema complex, sporting clubs, numerous restaurants, pubs, takeaway and fast food outlets. The Library and Recreation Centre are in the heart of the city.

SPORT

Sports fans will be delighted to hear about the new grounds for football, soccer, rugby league, tennis and netball. Other sporting groups represented in Palmerston are available on our website. Many sporting groups use school ovals for training and games and bookings for these ovals can be made through each school.

SKATE PARK AND WATER PARK

Skaters can take advantage of the Palmerston Skate Park and free Water Park, on University Avenue opposite McDonalds. The park is lit until 10pm and is managed by the Northern Territory Government.

MARKETS

On Friday nights from May to October, the Palmerston Markets are held in the City Centre. The markets feature local crafts and delicious international food, reflecting Palmerston's multicultural community. There are regular entertainers and activities for children, visit www.palmerstonmarkets.org.au for a complete list of activities planned for this year.

CYCLE PATHS

Palmerston currently has approximately 32 kilometres of existing cycle paths within parkways in existing suburbs. The intention is to provide a network of cycle paths that will allow cyclists to traverse the municipality fully. Maps of cycle paths are available online. Most paths are lit for night use and we will continue to update maps as more areas and cycle paths develop.

OUTDOOR EXERSITES EQUIPMENT

Council has coordinated the installation of four 'exersites' in the city's local parks. More commonly described as outdoor exercise equipment, the sites are located at Confalonieri Park, next to the Gray Community Hall

- President Park, Driver
- Durack Woodlake Blvd, corner of Pritchardia
- Joan Fejo Park, Duwan Road, Rosebery

These free to use facilities have been designed to be within easy walking distance of each other, creating a fitness trail for residents. Best of all, they're available for everyone to use so you can get a great workout, at your own pace, at any time.

FISHING AND BOATING

The Elizabeth River Bridge boat ramp is located minutes from the city centre off Erlundie Avenue. The public are advised that the river at this point is tidal (*up to 8m*) and that saltwater crocodiles and box jellyfish are present in these waters. The boat ramp area is maintained by the NT Government.

MITCHELL CREEK AND THE ESCARPMENT

Mitchell Creek and the Escarpment are ideal for bushwalking, nature study and bush tucker trails. They have a diverse range of natural habitats and several heritage areas, including shell middens and World War Two sites. The Creek is home to two significant plant species, the Eucalyptus atrovirens and Typhonium praetermissum. The scenic escarpment walk trail starts at Cunningham Crescent and ends in Rosebery.

COMMUNITY EVENTS

Palmerston has a rapidly growing reputation as a place where events and activities are recognised as a valuable part of our vibrant and diverse community. The City of Palmerston delivers a number of annual events and activities that enables people living, working or visiting our city to experience and participate in. Types of events include a community Australia Day celebration, Youth Week Events, Seniors Forums, School Holiday Programs as well as Carols to celebrate Christmas festivities. PALMERSTON SWIMMING AND FITNESS CENTRE

The centre is located in Moulden (cnr of Tilston Aveue and Bonson Terrace) and is managed by the YMCA on behalf of Council.

The centre boasts a 50 metre Olympic sized pool and toddler pool. The pools offer patrons the chance to escape the heat of the day and relax in the shade, as well as lanes for those who like to keep fit swimming laps. It is also equipped with a state-of-the-art hydraulic chair lift for people with disabilities. The centre has qualified lifeguards on duty and is open seven days a week.

PALMERSTON RECREATION CENTRE

Located in the heart of the city, the centre features two large community rooms (including lighting and air-conditioning) and two stadium courts (with or without lighting and air-conditioning) available to hire. There is also a half-court basketball area outside for general use.

The centre is a community facility for the delivery of sporting, recreational and community programs, events and services.

The centre is available to book online at Council's website.

GRAY COMMUNITY HALL

The hall is located in Gray (cnr of Victoria Drive and Essington Avenue). It is designed for purposes such as senior citizen activities, sport and recreation programs, church gatherings and service organisation meetings. It is equipped with a small kitchen facility, toilet facilities and lockable areas for storage.

HARVEST CORNER (GRAY) COMMUNITY GARDEN

In 2012, City of Palmerston began working with the community to establish Palmerston's first community garden at Confalonieri Park in Gray. Using funding provided by the Federal Government and in partnership with an enthusiastic bunch of community volunteers, Harvest Corner Community Garden sowed

its first seeds in 2013 and continues to grow under the management of its committee of local residents.

Our vision is that the Gray Community Garden inspires healthy and sustainable growth - in the garden, the gardeners and the whole community.

New members and kids are always welcome. Individual plots available. Working Bees are held on the third Sunday of each month, 8-10am. Social gathering on the first Friday of each month from 5pm.

DRIVER RESOURCE CENTRE

The centre is located in Driver (29 Driver Avenue). It is air-conditioned and designed for use by family and children's groups. The facility consists of a central open space with a separate kitchen and bathroom facilities with children's toilets. With an enclosed grass area, kids are free to explore the outdoors, while the interior is suitable for meetings as well as for activities for kids.

MARLOW LAGOON PET PARK

The only public place dogs are allowed to be off leash, Marlow Lagoon Pet Park features an obstacle course for active dogs.

There's also a smaller enclosure where dogs can become familiar with each other.

THE HEIGHTS, DURACK COMMUNITY CENTRE

The Heights, Durack Community Centre is located at 33 Packard Avenue, Durack. It is Palmerston's first and only purpose built art and culture space. The facility includes high ceilings, plenty of cross ventilation and natural lighting, two art rooms which open to a balcony, a small kitchenette, storage space and the rooms themselves are specifically designed for art and craft activities. Palmerston boasts over 100 parks scattered throughout the city, with a variety of facilities including playground equipment and free barbeques for family get-togethers.

MARLOW LAGOON

Marlow Lagoon is a popular recreational area located off Elrundie Avenue. Maintained by the City of Palmerston, this regional parkland offers free BBQ facilities, shaded picnic areas, open space, a bush plants park, public ovals, art path and play equipment. The island in the centre of the lagoon is a sanctuary for bird life.

The bush plants park, established within the grounds, is a unique project instigated by local residents, Rita Tingey and Chris Cox. With Council's assistance they have developed a park featuring bush plants used by Indigenous people for food, medicine and crafts. The site includes a rainforest hill, lowland section and swamp forest area.

The art path at Marlow Lagoon is a unique outdoor art project developed under the guidance of community artist, Techy Masero. This is a nationally recognised community project sponsored by City of Palmerston, the Northern Territory and Federal Governments. Students and other members of Palmerston's

community have developed the project that used tiles to form mosaic work depicting the flora and fauna of the area.

COMMUNITY BBQ TRAILER

City of Palmerston Community BBQ Trailer is free and available for use by members of the community, local organisations and groups to support activities and programs that directly benefit Palmerston residents.

The Building Better Neighbourhoods Program through the Community BBQ, creates an opportunity for members of the community and community groups to build better relationships with the people who live around us, strengthening our community through social interaction.




