COMMUNITY PLAN

Family and Community: Palmerston is a safe and family friendly community where everyone belongs.

PURPOSE

The purpose of this report is to provide an update of Animal Education activities from October to December 2020.

KEY MESSAGES

- City of Palmerston promotes responsible pet ownership.
- We seek to empower the community through education about responsible pet ownership.
- Animal Education Officer engaged with parents and children at the Children's Week Event giving advise and tips on safe ways for children to interact with their pets.
- Rangers facilitated a Canine Body Language Information Session on Understanding Canine Body Language at Palmerston Recreation Centre with ten community members attending.
- Regulatory Services attend an Animal Management Community Event at the Palmerston Indigenous Village in partnership with other stakeholders, building strong relationships and delivering key animal management information.

BACKGROUND

The City of Palmerston promotes responsible pet ownership. Pets are an important part of people's lives and contribute to their wellbeing by providing companionship. The effective management of companion animals requires commitment from the entire community.

DISCUSSION

Animal Management Activities

There were several Animal Education activities held over the October to December 2020 guarter.

In October 2020, the Animal Education Officer worked with a member of the Palmerston Youth Round Table to help with a project on cat management. The project was presented at the Youth Round Table

December meeting which focused on cat control. Aspects considered included the role of local and state and territory governments in cat management, trap, neuter, release programs and challenges in changing the mind sets of cat owners and the wider community.

The annual Children's Week event in October was attended by the Animal Education Officer who engaged with local families and children and spoke to them about animal education and regulation in the municipality.

On 11 November 2020, Positive Pets Palmerston on behalf of City of Palmerston held a 'Stop the Bark' information session at the Recreation Centre with nine community members attending. Feedback from the session indicates the topic was well received with residents feeling they had a better understanding of their dogs and could implement minor changes to make a huge improvement in their behaviour.



In December 2020, an Animal Education Officer attended a civics information session conducted by City of Palmerston for Woodroffe Primary School students. The Education Officer presented a session discussing dog registration, licensing, nuisance behaviours and why dogs should be on leads in public places.

On 8 December, Pawsitive K9 in conjunction with City of Palmerston, hosted information an session on "Understanding Canine Body Language" at the Recreation Centre with ten community members attending. Topics that were covered included how dogs use their senses, calming signals and dog behaviour.

On 21 December, representatives from Regulatory Services attended an animal management community event at the Palmerston Indigenous Village, hosted by Animal Management in Rural and Remote Indigenous Communities and Yilli Rreung Housing. The event was a great opportunity to build stronger relations with various stakeholders and educate on key animal management areas.

Operations Report

Dog registration

During the October to December 2020 quarter, Council recorded 1,323 new dog registrations an increase of 208 registrations from this time last year. Currently we have a total of 3,840 dogs registered as of 31 December 2020.

Types of complaints

For the quarter, Council received a total of 523 complaints; 274 of those complaints were received during business hours with the remaining 249 calls received outside working hours via the afterhours service. The majority of complaints were for dogs at large which can be contributed to seasonal increased storm activity and residents going away during the holiday period whilst leaving their dogs in the care of others. The second highest contact point was dogs contained for collection. There were also a relatively high level of calls received for barking complaints and licence application queries.



Calls received after hours do not necessarily translate to jobs being logged in the original complaint category initially reported by the resident. It is often the case that the job may be reclassified into a more appropriate category when further information is received.

Dog Attacks

There were 17 reported dog attacks within the municipality over the last quarter. Of these attacks, 12 can be categorised as being minor to moderate in nature; with superficial wounds to a person or animal, or where the complaint was withdrawn by the complainant. The remaining 4 attacks can be classified as severe having resulted in hospital treatment for a person, veterinary treatment for an animal or death of the animal. In one of these cases, the two offending dogs were required to be removed from the municipality.

Afterhours Patrols

Council conducted 31 afterhours patrols over the last quarter: with nine morning patrols and 22 evening patrols. The patrols included the investigation of illegal camp sites, reports of dogs at large and general monitoring of dog parks.






Impounding

Over the last quarter, Council impounded 141 dogs; 112 of those dogs were unregistered and 29 were registered. In order to be released from the pound, owners were required to register their dog(s) prior to release. Of the animals impounded, 91 dogs were returned to their owners, 41 of the dogs were rehomed; 8 dogs were euthanised and 1 dog was unlawfully obtained from Council. There were no dogs handed over to other Councils.



Infringements Issued

There has been an increase in infringements issued for animal management matters which can be linked to seasonal factors such as increased storm activity and increased enforcement action by Council. Infringements were issued for dogs at large, unregistered dogs and dogs causing nuisance.


